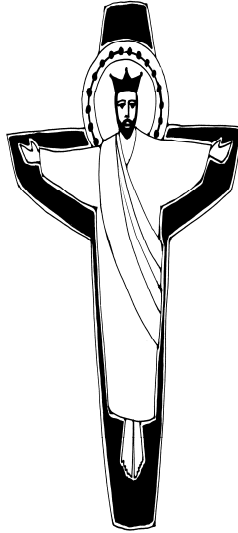

As we come to the last Sunday of Ordinary time in the Church's calendar, we once again celebrate the feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. The title "King" really doesn't grab us as Americans. We might enjoy it in musicals such as The King And I, or in movies such as King Kong. But when it comes to everyday life, we know that kings often act above the law. And in our country, nobody is above the law because we are a democracy. Yet if we take this title in a more spiritual sense, we can better understand how the title does fit Jesus so well. For a true "king" or "queen" in a spiritual sense is a servant of others. For He is humble and only wishes for our well-being. Think for a moment of our parents who worked so hard whether out at a job or at home keeping up a household: they were true leaders of our family. We could have easily crowned mom "queen" not only for a day, but for all time because of her dedication and sacrificial love of family. So too for dad whom we could have designated our "king" for working hard to support the family, putting his own needs in the background. Christ is our King more in this sense of sacrificial self-giving. Our parents were our leaders for a certain time period. And then we left home, their "dominion." But for Jesus there is no endpoint or time limit. He continues to give His life for us in the Eucharist, and through the loving community we try to build each day as His followers. He continues to die for us on the Cross when humanity sins, that is, gives into violence, hatred, and division. He continues to Rise by providing for us through the love and outreach of His followers. This is why we make the feast of Christ the King a very special day each year. Though it represents the end of the liturgical year, for Christians it is more than that: it is a day of giving gratitude to our King who continues to walk with us and bless us with God's abundant gifts. Isn't it awesome how Thanksgiving Day comes after the feast of Christ the King, and then the 1st Sunday of Advent follows? (December 5th) I hope we can come to have a deeper sense of gratitude for our King as the days roll on into the new liturgical year. Only in Jesus will the deepest longings of our soul be satisfied. ~ Fr. John

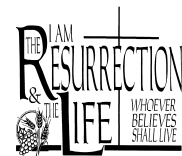
