Well, here we are back in Ordinary Time already in the Church's liturgical cycle. The holy days and holidays of the Christmas Season have moved past



us, and here we are already looking ahead next month to Lent! Isn't it true that everything seems to be moving faster these days: the days and weeks themselves, our responsibilities to family and work, and just in trying to keep up with what's going on in the world around us. It's almost as if we just about have time to breathe. I read a funny little story of an airplane ready to take off, as the flight attendant gave the passengers the usual first order to adjust their oxygen masks, but in an unusual way. He said: "Adjust your oxygen mask and breathe normally. If you don't know how to breathy normally, just breathe as you normally would!" The passengers erupted in laughter as the flight attendant sprinkled his safety speech with humor. Air travel can sometimes produce anxiety, and a bit of humor can cut the tension. What jumped out at me was his line: "Just breathe as you normally would." Again, isn't it true that we find ourselves holding our breath over a crisis or strained moment. Whether we are raising children and see that their decisions can hurt themselves, or waiting for an important medical diagnosis, we often just hold our breath out of worry. But I do believe Jesus tells us – in all seriousness: "Just breathe as you normally would." Because if we breathe normally, we are trusting Jesus' care for us when He says: "Peace I give to you." We know from experience that the peace that Jesus gives is not the same as the world gives. As we end the Christmas Season and enter into Ordinary time once again, let us always remember these words of Jesus to breath normally, no matter what. If we trust Jesus, we can even hear His words each day that He will take away not the cabin pressure, but the pressures of everyday life. The pilot of my soul has my life's flight plan well under control. With Jesus, I need not fear. ~ Fr. John


