I remember once bringing one of my Franciscan brothers to my mother's home for dinner. My mother was a great cook and that night she made some delicious pasta along with her famous meatballs. My friend did not have a cook in his friary and his mother had recently passed away. He was delighted to be invited to have a home cooked meal because he was so hungry for good food. We all know the sensation of hunger, so that when we are sitting down to have a great meal in front of us, we can't wait to dive in. We said a very short grace before the meal, then my confrere dove in to eat with great enthusiasm. My mother was delighted by his enjoyment of her cooking and kept placing more food on the table – so much that he had a second and then a third helping. At first, I wanted to ask mom to slow down given that she brought out so much food. She saw that uncomfortable look on my face, and then called me aside for a life lesson that I'll never forget. She said: "Don't you understand it's not how much food you have but how much joy you receive in sharing it." What a great lesson. Isn't it true that when we share what we have, even if we give it all away to someone in need, we receive tremendous joy and satisfaction? Isn't that the lesson of today's Gospel? Jesus doesn't start with much food, only finding 5 barley loaves and 2 fish, then multiplies this to feed over five thousand people. His real joy was not so much in miraculously creating such an abundance of food but in sharing it with those who were hungry. That was the true miracle! This is why God takes so much delight when people share their goods with one another. When that spirit abounds among us, we receive enormous joy which stays with us for a very long time. Isn't this the miracle we are called to participate in when we share in the Eucharist? God gives us His total self in the sharing of His son Jesus in the Eucharist, and we give God great joy in return when we receive this gift with gratitude and a new spirit of love. So, after I learned my lesson from Mom, I would take my friends over to the house and say to her: "Keep on bringing that delicious food, Mom; I so enjoy seeing the look of deep joy on your holy face!" ~ Fr. Homeless Ministry Food Request

We give away 20-30 bags of food to the homeless every week. The homeless require special foods since they are unable to cook food. We are asking for help to supply the following items in the homeless bags:

- pork & beans
- ravioli/canned pasta
- bottled water/juice/energy drink
- protein shakes (not in powder form)
- canned/sealed tuna, chicken, meat
- snacks/crackers
- small jars or individual size of peanut butter & jam

If possible, please choose the flip top cans (no need for a can opener). Please also remember not to leave fresh food as we do not have a way to preserve them. Items may be left in the back of the church or dropped off at the parish office during regular office hours. Thank you.
