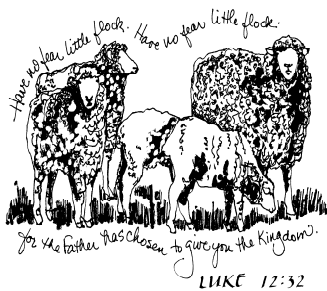

"Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions." (Luke 12)

Today's saying by Jesus really hits hard at the core of our human nature. Jesus understands the way we humans act at times. The more of a good thing we have, the more we want, then the more we compare what we have with what our neighbor's have. I remember going to a United Nations session as a guest with a friend some years ago. The topic was on "Education and War." It was a catchy title, and since I was teaching at a nearby hospital at the time I thought I might learn something. The speakers who were educators from all around the world, traced most human problems of war, poverty, violence, migration, and racism back to one major source: greed! They concluded that if we can't have as much as or more than our neighbor, then these problems follow. The educators gave the example of a parent serving some pie to their children for dessert. As the parent cuts a piece of pie and hands it out to each child, the first thing the child does is to look to see how big a piece their sibling got in comparison to their own piece. If one felt cheated with a slightly smaller piece, they would argue, cry, and even fight out of a sense of injustice! It was the parents' job to teach their children not to be so greedy; to help them understand that sometimes some people receive more than others. And the way to avoid fighting is to offer to share some of their extra pie with the others. It sounded easy, but it is a very hard lesson. My dear brothers and sisters, we have to beware of greed, which is in all of us; no one is excluded from this. It is the result of the original sin of our first parents which we have inherited. Jesus came to right this wrong. He teaches us that the antidote to greed is compassion; the willingness to see that our neighbor has as much as we do. For the last shall be first and the first shall be last. I honestly get worried for our country when I hear things said like: "It's all about the economy!" If by that we mean that the economy should benefit more equitably all peoples at all levels of society, then that expression makes sense. If it means that I should accumulate as much as I can with disregard to my neighbor's plight, I am not a faithful Christian. Catholic Social Teaching has always promoted this teaching of Jesus; that sharing is caring. The best antidote to greed is loving our neighbor as ourselves. ~ Fr. John
